003-2 ABSTRACT Recent studies have used regression decomposition to analyze recent data and found that over several percent of the Blackwhite wealth differences remained unexplained (See, e.g., Wolfman and Wolff 2000; Altonji, Di Fonzo, and Song 2003; and Blair and Graham 1999). Their results are limited to the nation in modern data. This study compares empirical methods and historical empirical results to the literature on economic decomposition. In this paper, James Curtis Jr. presents structural regress on decompositions, which are modifications to methods developed by Becker (1977) and Canora (1973). (i) James Curtis Jr. presents a basic empirical test when analyzing structural regression decompositions. (ii) James Curtis Jr. reports the estimated sources of Blackwhite differences in wealth (credit, labor, and other compensation) and (iii) James Curtis Jr. links those findings to recent studies. Empirical estimates confirm that the size and persistence of modern Blackwhite wealth differences have historical roots. (Curtis Jr 2017)

At the same time, it offers the possibility to assess the success limiting conditions of economic models and theories, highlighting the contextual determinants of their validity (Friedman 2017). In so doing, it offers a prominent view of the relationship between agency and structure, highlighting the duality of the former and the complexity of the latter in an underdetermined perspective that takes at least the complex and chaotic state of economic dynamics."
